Like some of you maybe, I wasn't really taught about the Traditions directly. Sure, they hung on the wall but in the groups I attended they were never directly addressed. I often joke that the only reason that I ever learned about the traditions was by breaking them all.

I was only concerned about my individual welfare, I was fairly sure I was my own ultimate authority, I had no money or property to speak of but lived solely on outside contributions, no being at all self-supporting, I was however without doubt nonprofessional and unorganized still I was prone to be opinionated and drawn to public controversy. Still, I was full of pride and promoted myself often yet attracted no one.

Today, after many hard learned lessons I believe more than ever we cannot afford to let the Traditions simply be decoration for our meeting room walls. My sponsees will tell you that I am every bit as eager to talk Traditions as I am the Steps. And while you can achieve sobriety from taking the Steps you can simultaneously wreak havoc on the Fellowship without learning our Traditions.

At the end of the day the traditions again were written to ensure the AA Fellowship would remain united but sadly, I too often hear these principles used more as weapons for division than tools for Unity. I cringe when I hear someone spout out "each group should be autonomous" to which I will match their spouting with "Except in matters affecting other groups or AA as a whole."

Sadly, I still hear people who are concerned about who makes up our membership. Bill in his writing states..." That is why we all judge the newcomer less and less. If alcohol is an uncontrollable problem to him and he wishes to do something about it that is enough for us. We care not whether his case is severe or light, whether his morals are good or bad, whether he has other complications or not. Our A.A. door stands wide open, and if he passes through it and commences to do anything at all about his problem, he is considered a member of Alcoholics Anonymous. He signs nothing, agrees to nothing, and promises nothing. We demand nothing. He joins us on his own say-so. Nowadays, in most groups, he doesn't even have to admit he is an alcoholic. He can join A.A. on the mere suspicion that he may be one, that he may already show the fatal symptoms of our malady.

Additionally, one of the concerns I hear most often as Delegate is about money, money that our groups have, and the money that our Districts, Area and GSO spend. This I guess will always be a place of debate...Again Bill writes...Where the proper use of money ends—and its misuse begins—is the point in "spiritual space" we are all seeking.

So, I know that more than likely I am preaching to the choir and that if you have taken time out of your day to actually read the newsletter, you too consider yourself a Guardian of the Traditions and I thank you. But I want to challenge you to think about how you use the principles...Are you using them to maintain unity? Are you using them to ensure the fellowship relates itself appropriately to the world about it? And finally are you using them to make sure our program continues to live and grow?

COOPERATION WITH PROFESSIONAL COMMUNITY

12th Step your Doctor!

Q: What!? My doc's a drunk!?

A: No, no, no. Well, could be, but that's not the point. The point is:

- Reach out to your doctor and let them know what Alcoholics Anonymous is, and how's it's helped you to find sobriety, and how it might be able to help some of his/her other patients who might have a drinking problem
- Take them some pamphlets like "AA as a Resource for the Health Care Professional" and "If you are a Professional..."
- Ask if they 'd be willing to let you put some pamphlets or Grapevine magazines in their waiting room. If they say yes, consider using an "Adopt-a-Rack" literature rack for this, you can contact the PI Chair to get one at pi@aa-seta.org, or if that doesn't work try the CPC chair at cpc@aa-seta.org. You could also just order a subscription to the grapevine and place one in the waiting room each month.
- Let the doctor know he/she can refer people to the local intergroup number for meeting information, that you'd be willing to be a contact as well (if you are), and that the CPC committee can be reached at cpc@aa-seta.org to put on presentations about AA for his/her staff or peers. Our website for professionals is http://cpc.aa-seta.org
- If you could do any or all of these things, you are carrying the message through CPC service!

O: What's CPC?

A: CPC stands for Cooperation with the Professional Community, it's a standing committee at the Area level and often in Districts as well. Individuals can do CPC work with simple but important activities like the one above.

- **CPC Committee Purpose** "Members of C.P.C. committees inform professionals and future professionals about A.A.— what we are, where we are, what we can do, and what we cannot do. They attempt to establish better communication between A.A.s and professionals, and to find simple, effective ways of cooperating without affiliating." reprinted from Cooperation with the Professional Community Workbook, page 5, with permission from A.A. World Services, Inc.
- **Professionals are**: Basically, anyone that comes into contact with an alcoholic through their professional work, some examples include: Doctors, lawyers, judges, cops, therapists, counselors, nurses, probation and parole officers, clergy, social workers, etc....


Third, the **2020 International Convention Frequently Asked Questions** – Registration, Housing, & Transportation is readily available to start making plans for July 2 – 5, 2020.


