#### HELLO SE TX AREA 67!

As I write to you tonight I have just returned from the Southwest Regional Delegates Assembly. It is the annual event held in OKC that is the training weekend for delegates. Thank you for sending me to this service event, as it one more way that your delegate gets prepped and ready to attend the 64<sup>th</sup> General Service Conference to represent SETA Area 67.

Our SW Regional Trustee gave a wonderful report to this assembly on Saturday evening. Clayton reminded all of us that serving the newcomer or still-suffering alcoholic who has not found our fellowship and solution can be inconvenient. How you say? You know. We get telephone calls late at night. We get asked to go and carry the message when we want to stay home. We miss family birthdays, funerals, and other special times with our loved ones. It is inconvenient. Remember though, that if we say yes to these requests, who benefits? We do. We stay sober. We get the experience that helps us to carry on in our journey of recovery. In addition, the new man or woman who needs us is saved from death.

Many of you have asked me, how do you do this service of being a Delegate? I just keep saying yes to the requests and commitments. I am benefitting greatly and sometimes it is inconvenient! But, I would not trade it for anything. I ask each of you to remember that you can say YES too. Don't miss out. If I can do this service, anyone can. I am just a sober recovering alcoholic like you. We have plenty of service to do in our area to carry the message to the still-suffering alcoholics.

#### **ATTENTION GSR:**

During each quarterly assembly, there are workshops for Group Service Representatives (GSR's). They start at 8:30 am and are held in three different rooms.

New GSR Orientation is in the El Paso Room. Advanced GSR is in the Galveston Room. Also there will be a bilingual GSR/RSG Ask It Basket on 8pm Saturday.

#### **NEWS AND ANNOUNCEMENTS FROM THE DELEGATE:**

- A. GREAT NEWS: With the closing of 2013, we celebrated December as the highest month in contributions ever recorded. Expressions of gratitude from members and groups for December totaled \$850,000! Keep those 7<sup>th</sup> Tradition contributions coming to support the work we ask our General Service Office to do.
- B. Publishing sales: 2013 saw much activity in literature sales, and we ended the year with \$12,837,474 in total gross sales vs. an annual estimate of sales projected to be \$12,800,000. We did better!
- C. During 2013, A.A.W.S. made a profit of \$93,500 and Grapevine made a profit of \$315,000.
- D. The General Service Board approved a transfer of \$1,500,000 from the Reserve Fund to the Pension Plan. What does this do to the outstanding funding of our pension plan obligations? We still have a large unfunded liability of \$9,000,000.
- E. Clayton V. our SW Regional Trustee has been appointed as Chairperson of a Subcommittee to review La Vina financial reporting and support.
- F. Preliminary information on 2015 International Convention. The convention will be held July 2-5, 2015 in Atlanta, Georgia. The theme of the international convention is "80 Years – Happy, Joyous and Free".

Registration forms will be mailed in August 2014 to all G.S.R.s, Intergroups. Online registration will be available September 3, 2014.

2015 International Convention pre-registration fee will be \$100 (USD) per attendee and onsite registration will be \$110 (USD) per attendee.

Once you have registered for the convention, you will be able to sign up for housing. In order to make the housing process as fair as possible, no hotels should be contacted directly. All housing requests will be processed through the Official Housing Bureau. You can locate all current information at www.aa.org.

- G. The 2015 International Convention Souvenir Book will be available in English, French and Spanish and similar to the format of the 1995 and 2005 International Conventions. The content will include some of A.A.'s early history, legacy of service, international timeline and more.
- H. During 2013, the General Service Office (G.S.O.s) was pleased to welcome 1,942 visitors. In addition, the Archives staff responded to approximately, 1,480 requests for information and research – demonstrating the Fellowship's continued interest in Archives and history.
- I. A.A. World Services Board approved that all full length A.A. videos, except those for members only, for example, "Markings on the Journey", be posted on G.S.O.'s A.A. website.
- J. Digital Publishing Program (eBooks) update is that currently, Alcoholics Anonymous and the Twelve & Twelve (both in English) are published on Amazon, Barnes & Noble and Apple iTunes stores.
- K. The production of the 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary 1<sup>st</sup> edition of the Big Book remains on schedule for April 2014 delivery, with current pre-orders approaching 60,000 copies.
- L. At the February 2014 A.A.W.S. Board meeting a request was discussed to translate the Commemorative 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Edition of the First Edition, first printing of Alcoholics Anonymous into Spanish and French and the Board agreed to take no action.

However, the Board suggested developing ways besides full translation to make the 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Edition accessible to French and Spanish speaking members, and asked the publishing director to bring back suggestions to the March, 2014 Board meeting for how this might be accomplished.

M. Grapevine is turning 70 years old! Discussions continue regarding Grapevine 70 (GV70) events across the U.S. and Canada. Check out the events at www.aagrapevine.org or ask our SETA Grapevine Committee Chair Barbara G.

- N. The senior editor of La Vina reported that recent issues of La Vina have included "The Lessons of Relapse" (Nov/Dec 2013) and "Hitting the Bottom and Reaching the Surface (Jan/Feb 2014).
- O. Clayton V. our Southwest Regional Trustee will be attending our 2014 July Area Assembly! In addition, he has been asked to be a speaker and workshop facilitator at our 2015 SETA Convention in Galveston.

I have so much more I could share, but there will be time...

**FINAL COMMENTS:** I have attending many district meetings, standing committees, workshops and anniversaries this first quarter and Melissa has been right by my side keeping me pumped up with Diet Cokes! I want to thank Melissa R., your Alternate Delegate, for being a great example of what an Alternate of any position should do: participate with the trusted servant holding the actual position. This provides the alternate the opportunity to listen, watch, learn and ask questions.

**REMEMBER:** My focus is to inform you about Alcoholics Anonymous as a whole and to be the voice of your ideas, experiences and collective group conscience. I know our Area is in your capable hands.

# ALTERNATE DELEGATE

#### Hello Area 67 Members,

It has been a busy and exciting time in SETA 67 this quarter. Like many of you in the second year of a term, I've learned a lot about my service position. That always seems to bring a measure of comfort and an increased ability to grow - and that's exciting!

I really enjoyed the SETA Convention in January - District 90 did a wonderful job! Patrick and I hosted the GSO Speaker, Mary D, and I had the honor of taking her and the speaker from California to the airport. Since we were in Beaumont and the airport in Houston, I got to hear many stories that weren't shared from the podium - just another perk to be had when being of service!

Over the past three months I've attended several District meetings, workshops and special events and I've learned from all of them. I've worked closely with our Delegate this year, in planning and preparing for the April Round Tables. We've made several pre-Conference District visits, informing DCMs and GSRs alike the about General Service Conference Agenda Items, confidential background material and the summaries prepared from it, and the Delegate's response forms. There's а general sense of excitement about participating in the process. I look forward to seeing many of you there.

I particularly enjoyed attending SWRDA (Southwest Regional Delegates Assembly) earlier this month. I want to thank the Area for the opportunity to be there.

Area 67 was well-represented – in addition to Patrick and I, Paul M, Harold P, Betsy G, Gus H, Beth R and Rodney R were also in attendance.

The Round Table (or Mock Conference) workshop was a true learning experience. Our own Gus H was called upon to act as Alternate Chair for this year's SWRDA, which put him in charge of the Round Table event. Alternate Delegates were appointed to act as recorders for the tables and each Delegate was the Committee Chair for his table. We spent a couple of hours learning to deal with stubborn, close-minded "delegates" who continually took discussions off-track - which was hilarious! and learning how to guide a committee towards arriving at an informed conscience group consensus.

As was the case last year, there were several thought-provoking presentations presented by Past Delegates from around the Region. I plan to share parts of those presentations in future newsletters. But for now, I would like to share some statistics that our Regional Trustee, Clayton V gave in his report:

- 7-12% of the U.S. population is alcoholic: an estimated 14 million people of whom 1/3 are women and 2/3rds men.
- There is an estimated 140 million alcoholics world-wide, of which 1.5% are A.A. members.
- There are 79,000 alcoholic deaths annually – directly from alcoholism.

- 2 million people suffer from alcoholic liver disease.
- 1 in 25 deaths can be attributed to alcohol.
- 22% of all police time is spent on cases involving alcohol.
- 13% of all sick days are alcoholrelated.
- 40% of all traffic-related deaths are attributable to alcohol.
- Drinking and driving creates (1) injury per minute and (1) death every 32 minutes.
- Drunk drivers cost \$50 billion annually.
- Only 25% of alcoholics get any type of help.
- Alcohol abuse is accountable for (4) million emergency room visits and 1.6 million hospital stays.
- 20% of suicide deaths are alcohol-related.
- 35% of violent crimes involve an offender drinking at the time of the incident.
- 53% of adults in the U.S. report having one or more close relatives with a drinking problem.
- 75% of spousal abuse incidents involve an offender under the influence of alcohol.

As Clayton noted, we are the best hope the world has to deal with this problem of alcoholism.

### **CHAIR**

It includes the General Service Conference Agenda item workshop conducted by our Area 67 Delegate. The Workshops for voting Agenda items are SETA Job Ad Hoc Committee Cooperation and Description, Affiliation recommendation, Changes to SETA Election Procedures, and making a GSO Donation in honor of a deceased past Trustee. The proposed 2015 Budget will be presented but the workshop and vote will be at the July Assembly. Also occurring at the Assembly are DCMs reports to the Area, GSR workshops, Area Service Committee meetings and a morning AA meeting on Sunday.

There is a moment for me when all my fears came face to face with God's will. I have not quite walked away from my fears and I haven't taken a step along the road of faith. I am filled with a terrifying sense of dread and a momentous thrill of excitement. I take a deep breath and there is calm like being in the eye of a hurricane. And a realization that I am in exactly the place God's wants me to be, doing exactly what he wants me to do.

People often ask me why do I do service. Or they tell me service is not for them. I just smile and go on doing what I have to do to stay sober. My fear of a life without sobriety far outweighs any of the other fears I have to face to stay sober.

I have lived in my house with my wife Karen for quite a number of years. During my drinking days one of the bedrooms was set up as a sports room/dog house/ place to sleep off hangover spot for me. The room had a ratty old couch with cushions that form fitted my body with little sweat ringlets on it (and that was the good side of the cushions). A television for my pretend sports watching and a refrigerator just in case by accident a beer or two had survived the previous night. The room had an odor of ten to twenty years of unwashed drunk.

After Rachel was born we re did the room in princess and blue. Got rid of the couch, tv and refrigerator. We replaced the carpet to get rid of much of the odor and used baby diapers kind of took care of the rest.

A few months ago I dreamed about that room. In that dream I woke up back on that couch. I looked around and that room was exactly as I had seen it on the "millions" of days (not mornings) that I had awakened there. I could even smell that unwashed drunk odor. I had a hangover so I sat on the couch for a moment confused. I didn't remember the night before (black out drunk) but I remembered the dream I had while languishing in my drunken stupor.



In that dream I had finally sobered up after years of trying and failing. I had given up and turned myself over to the care of God. I had found the fellowship of AA and had found a sponsor and worked the steps. I had seen a fellowship grow up around me as day by day I looked for opportunities to serve. I not only recovered what I had lost but accomplished far more than Ronald could ever imagine. Promises were happening in my life and I knew peace.

In that moment sitting on that couch, hung-over and unwashed, I realized that my life of sobriety was just a drunken dream. The feelings of terror, bewilderment, frustration and despair all flooded back at once and I cried out in pain at all that I had lost. I felt as if my soul had been ripped to pieces.

I awoke sobbing with tears streaming down my face. Karen and Rachel gave me a look of such concern and asked me what was hurting me. After realizing that I was sober and pinching myself to ensure that at I was finally awake. I hit my knees in gratitude and thanked God that the room and the Ronald of almost fifteen years ago were gone. I hugged and kissed my daughter and my wife good morning and prepared myself for another day of service with a grateful heart.

When I asked the family for information about memorial services, they told me that Tandy didn't want a fuss made at his passing and there would be no services.

Hearing this I was satisfied that my long-time ally in archives and friend remained consistent to the end. He was solid that way. He will be sorely missed for this trait and other qualities. I didn't always appreciate his economic usage of words, or stubborn silence, on those occasions when we disagreed. Just the same, right or wrong in my opinion, he stood his ground. And, we always agreed on the importance of "keeping the record straight" and a functioning archives for the Area.

The whole picture (to be accurate) demands a long list of virtues. I thought of him as the strong, silent type for reasons I've made clear and as always being to the point. And I often found myself looking his way after the rest of us on the committee had said our piece (at some length) about a matter.

He was dedicated, detailed and thorough – immeasurably positive qualities in archives.

I was at his bedside in the hospital to spell my friend Sherry. His breathing was labored and he had difficulty speaking, but he made the effort to let me know he had not looked at the spreadsheet of motions I had emailed before we knew he was so sick. So typical of the person I knew! I assured him that there was no problem and that I would be sending the motions to the Web Master in the near future in an effort to assure him things were as they should be.

He will be missed by all of us on the Archives Committee and of course, the members of the SETA assembly, the fellowship in his community, friends and family, or more to the point (in other words), the many people who knew him!






