

Trust has always been hard for me. I was never trustworthy, nor did I hang out with trustworthy people. That weekend I could see trust evident in AA people. It gave me courage to go back and ask for a sponsor (I can trust another) and wanting to be part of this society. I didn't know the seed of trust would grow to the hope I needed. I feel somehow changed and am so grateful I got to go.




