Keep your A.A. telephone list with you all the time. If a drinking urge or panic comes—postpone everything else until you've called an A.A.



Find out about the special holiday parties, meetings, or other celebrations

given by groups in your area, and go. If you're timid, take someone newer than you are.




Skip any drinking occasion you are nervous about. Remember how clever you were at excuses when drinking? Now put the talent to good use. No office party is as important as saving your life.

2018 Southwest Regional Forum Report

October 20-22, 2017


San Antonio, TX

- Friday began with Welcome by Yolanda F., Southwest Regional Trustee and Opening Remarks by Michelle Grinberg,
 Class A (nonalcoholic) Trustee, GSB, Chairperson followed by presentations from both Class B and A Trustees with regards to General Service Board. Corporate Board presentations given by AAWS Board member and Grapevine Board
 member. General Sharing Session was conducted by Greg T., General Manager of GSO. The evening ended with Corrections DVD Presentation of "A New Freedom"
- Saturday morning started with presentations from 5 current delegates in the Southwest Region, including our own Delegate, Ron C. Topics presented where Technology in AA: Communication for our Present (The Future is Now!), Working with non-English Speaking Groups and Members (Ron's presentation), Our Common Welfare: Safety in AA, Three Legacies, Anonymity: Our Spiritual Foundation. The Technology in AA presentation showed that most of AA's thoughts of it being "evil" are based on fear; that instead of looking at it as a source of harm how do we use it as a source that can help make AA more effective. The Working with non-English Speaking presentation emphasized the importance of patience when trying to communicate from one language to the other. Keep it simple with nouns and verbs, slang and idioms don't translate well, and always speak from the heart instead of trying to translate literally. The Three Legacies presentation spoke on all sides of our triangle, Recovery, Unity and Service; we need them all. They all fit together to carry the message and guide us to the solution. The Anonymity showed various ways in which it was less about confidentiality and more about humility and self-sacrifice. Breaking anonymity for pats of the back instead of reaching someone who needs the hand of AA was just one of the ways. (I have the 4 out of 5 of the presentations in pdf format if anyone is interested.)
- The theme for the full forum workshop was Anonymity and the Internet; Dave H., Delegate from Area 66 presented. The Internet Guidelines, MG-18 was referenced as a good source for this topic. This subject is a constant reminder of Tradition 11 and how we must be active guardians of it.
- GSB Presentation of Finance was presented my David M., CPA, GSB Treasurer. Some highlights were that 10% of GSO contributions are done online. Literature sales are up 5% from 2015. Grapevine subscription levels incread in 2016, resulting in net income \$165,000. 7th Tradition self-suport 2016 \$7.9 million; Groups \$6.5 million, Individuals \$609,000. 7th traditions of self-suport supported about 80% of services in 2016. Total expenses for 2016 \$22.6 million. Highest cost to fellowship provided is the General Service Conference. (If you are interested in further detail, please ask me for a copy of the presentation.)
- The Big Book is soon to be in 71 languages; currently working on Navaho translation but since it is an oral language, this could take a bit more time. Punjabi Big Book is not available in US and Canada since the printing and distribution is at GSO.
- Current project at GSO is a total website design; currently in the selection process for a new vendor; 3 possibilities currently.
- I attended the CPC Cooperation without Affiliation workshop and found it to be very interesting. With all the information and ways to Cooperate with the professional community it made me appreciate how well our area committee does this!
- At the Tradition Ten- The AA Groups Oppose No One workshop, I learned more about how we can be more inclusive without diluting our program. This workshop tied in well with the CPC one I attended. By understanding what AA is, what it isn't and what we do, CPC and Tradition Ten merge beautifully.
- Several members of district 40 attended the forum for the first time and had lots of great questions! I was so proud of all of them.
- I will be happy to provide the final Forum report as soon as it is available.



 - Attended 21st Annual NAAAW (National AA Archives Workshop) in Winnipeg, Manitoba; brought Area 67 Archives display showing the history of early AA in the Houston and Texas area; put together by our Archivist Sarah D.
 - Much of the focus of the workshop was on Anonymity and the fact that any Archive material available to the public should be divested of last names - even posthumously.
 - As usual at an AA workshop the days were long and full of information; began with an AA recovery
 meeting and ended with a special presentation to the full group; multiple break-out sessions on various
 topics with special care given to the focus on how to manage Archives; sessions on the history of Canadian AA and Manitoba/Winnipeg AA.
 - What I personally found the most helpful were the sessions on Introduction to Archives Basic Standards, Practical Preservation presented by two non-member friends with extensive experience in Archives. This gave many practical suggestions; unfortunately many of them are quite beyond our budget. They also gave us a list of resources that could be very beneficial in our efforts. The second was presentation Digital Archives: Why, Why Not and How. This provided so much information on the digitization of materials that I got a second CD of this presentation for our committee member in charge of digital media.
 - The record of what occurred is going to be available online at the NAAAW site and in the Area 67 Archives.; In 1957 Bill W. reminded us that keeping accurate records of our history was of extreme importance so that our message would never be diluted or distorted.
