June marks the month of our long running Traditions Dinner & I wanted to share my personal history with this event. It is responsible for so many results in my life today, it sparked the fire for service in me, helped me learn how to work well *with* others, how to consider fellow members opinions, how to be a better parent & how to have fun. For 12 years my kids have helped in some capacity with the Traditions Dinner, a lot of behind the scenes work has taken place by their hands. Sometimes begrudgingly, sometimes not. Every year my son asks me what the main dish is & starts to prepare himself for the workload that may come home with his Momma. This year I told him that he was old enough to make his own decision & from now on the commitment was his to make, but he was always welcome to come enjoy a plate, just bring some money. He asked me what my job was this year & when I told him his eyes got huge, he recognizes what a privilege this is.

I wouldn't say any one year has been better than another year, but every single year has brought its own powerful message into my heart & life. However, it all started with the first year I participated, 2004. To say that my alcoholism affected my family would be an understatement and as hard as I tried to bring the principles into my home life, specifically my relationship with my children I just wasn't seeing much results in some areas. At just under 2 years sober I found myself thrown into the pit...the District 40 pit. I was at a District 40 meeting more confused than ever. Everyone kept talking about this thing called a Traditions Dinner & apparently it was critical that we have pink lemonade & lots of lasagna! Naïve that I was I did the unthinkable & asked *THE* question, "Who's going to make the lasagna?" Why we think you'd be great at that was the unanimous reply!

So several weeks later I found myself at St. Christopher's Church with my litter mate, my 8 year old daughter & 40 lasagnas. One of the affects my drinking had on my daughter was a painful shyness, fear of people, new situations & being a part of due to a lack of stability within our home life. As we set off cooking the food, I happen to peek out the kitchen door & there she was, helping the Alt. DCM, Chuck decorate the tables with a smile on her sweet little face. As the evening progressed, Chuck opened the Dinner first with a prayer & then recognizing all the servants who participated, starting with my daughter's name; the impossible had become possible. I have to this day not seen another child shine as bright as she was at that moment. She had been lead through her fears & was thriving from her service. I then knew that if all I have to do is be willing to raise my hand and ask those silly questions to receive the healing power of God's Grace, then I WAS IN, the spark for service was lit.

This year's Dinner marks a full circle for me. It is an opportunity for me to stand beside my sidekick, as past D40 DCM & Alt. DCM & give back to my District that has given me & my family so much. It is an opportunity for me to say THANK YOU! My son recognizes what a privilege it is to be one of the D40 Traditions Dinner presenters because he grew up lighting up the background with his Sister as a small part of a great whole making this Dinner possible for the presenter & for the fellowship to enjoy. I do not know what this event has brought or will bring into your own personal life, but more than anything if you are new to service, new to District 40, new to AA I pray that you let it light the spark for service, so that the path can be lit for you as you travel your own circle in life.

#### The Change That Comes

Service was something I thought I HAD to do in Alcoholics Anonymous. In my twisted mind, it was almost as if I had to be of service in order to continue as a member of AA. That was one of the reasons I didn’t say no when I was asked/told that I was the Alternate GSR for my home group. I went to the district meetings... most of them. I half-heartedly participated in the district events, committees, etc. I wanted the pat on the back that I was doing my part. I remember being somewhat excited about it on occasion, but for the most part I just went through the motions. And I certainly had no sense of putting God in the middle of it.

I had to hit a Service Bottom! Which was incidentally just a small part of my own spiritual, emotional and mental bottom. It’s amazing how even after almost 3 ½ years sober (or free of alcohol); I was still completely insane!

One night after a group conscience meeting, I asked a fellow district committee member a rather simple question about an upcoming event; I didn’t exactly get the answer I was expecting. What I did get was a figurative slap across the back of the head! I was basically read the riot act on how poorly I was doing my service job and if I wasn’t able to perform the job as the Alternate GSR, maybe I should think about turning it over. Not those exact words, but it gives a general idea of how I perceived it.

I was stunned! Then embarrassed, then hurt, then incredibly pissed off and every other “poor me” feeling that I could come up with to take on the victim role! Needless to say, I was totally DONE with that committee member. How dare they!

Of course, I instantly had to tell someone about it! Luckily there was someone that actually listened to me. When all my complaining and whining was over, I realized it was me that wasn’t OK. I needed something more for myself, something I had been denying myself for a long time. I needed God. I needed the Steps. I wasn’t at all spiritually fit and my personal program was non-existent. How could I possibly be of service to anyone else if I was doing such a disservice to God and myself?

This “bottom” led to many changes in my life, most of which were internal. After all, that was the root of all my problems...me. I found a new sponsor. I worked ALL of my steps fully! I learned what it was like to be quiet and listen to others as well as God, rather than just being quiet and listening to my own thoughts. I still threw a few pity parties, had a few “poor me” moments and trudged through my service work half-heartedly. But I did what I was told. I didn’t have to always like it or agree with it, I just had to be willing, and I was. That was the difference I saw in myself. I was done with My Way. It hadn’t worked for me and the only person I had still been trying to convince was the woman staring back at me in the mirror.

When I started to feel as though I was allowing God to work through me instead of doing everything my way, I had a discussion with my sponsor about that particular committee member who had given me the “head slap.” My sponsor pointed out that instead of being defensive at what had been said TO me; perhaps I could approach this member and ask what I could better do to be of maximum service in my position. Holy Cow! There’s a concept... Asking others for help! So, my sponsor was *suggesting* that I set my pride aside and ask for assistance?

After lots of prayers and lots of deep breaths, I swallowed my pride long enough to approach this member after a district service meeting and do what was *suggested* to me. I was a little scared and intimidated to ask such a simple question again. Last time I did, I was given a “head slap.” But THIS TIME, I didn’t get the same reaction. I wasn’t read the riot act. I wasn’t told I was doing a poor job as an Alternate GSR. What I WAS informed of is that it’s okay to ask for help. It’s okay to admit if I was struggling and couldn’t fulfill my duties to the best of my abilities, I just needed to reach out to someone for guidance. This member was all too willing to share their experience as well as suggest several other members that would be happy to do the same, all I had to do was ask.

To this day, I’m still blown away at how different those two conversations were with the same person. The only way I can explain it is God! I brought Him into my life, worked my steps, and worked on me. The other person didn’t necessarily change, the situation didn’t really change, but I did. It was because I had worked MY program first. My attitude and outlook had changed.

Since then I’ve relied a lot on this particular district member to help guide me in many facets of service. I’ve gone from Alternate GSR to GSR. I’ve had to step up in some of my roles as a district service member. I’ve confidently volunteered on sub-committees in places that I know I can be of maximum service or places where I feel I could learn more. What better way to learn than to dive in the middle? I have a slight fear of going too high up in service roles, but that isn’t for me to stress about. God will lead me on that path if that’s where He wants me to be.

One of the most profound moments I had in my attitude change towards service came on a day when I was *just doing my job*. Nothing more or nothing less. I needed assistance and I reached out in an email to that once intimidating committee member. I was blown away by the message I received back. The first paragraph said, “...thank you for being responsible in your commitment... I am very proud of you!” I had to read that same sentence several times. This person who had only months ago given me that “head slap,” who intimidated me, whose standards I thought I could never live up to, just told me they were grateful and proud of me. Tears welled up in my eyes, I was shocked! And I was tremendously grateful. I also felt pride in myself; the kind that comes from simply doing the ‘next right thing.’ All I had done was follow directions or suggestions; God’s directions, my sponsor’s *suggestions*, those suggested in the Big Book and of course, the ones I asked for from that particular member.

Today, I don’t HAVE to do service ‘work’... I GET to be of service! It’s an honor, a privilege, and a blessing!

# Flower Power!!!

Bill's application of AA principles to ever-changing circumstances was another of his remarkable talents.

Day in and day out, letters would arrive at his desk asking for his "last word" on a matter of AA policy. And, in answer after answer Bill would fall back upon the basic principles of AA's three Legacies, tempered by wisdom, humor, perspective, and regard for the feelings of others.

One warm example occurred in 1968 when a well-meaning AA wrote to Bill, in deep concern, about an influx of youthful hippies or flower children to local AA groups, along with their distinctive manner of dress, sexual mores, and other unorthodox behavior, including the use of drugs. The writer feared that this particular invasion might be "a very real threat to our wonderful, God-given program." Bill's reply was typical of his use of AA principles to meet new challenges.

"Your letter about the hippie problem, so-called, was mighty interesting to me. I doubt that we need to be alarmed about this situation, because there have been precedents out of the past. All sorts of outfits have tried to move in on us, including communists and heroin addicts, prohibitionists and do-gooders of other persuasions.

Nearly all of these people, who happened to have an individual problem with alcohol, not only failed to change AA, but, in the long run, AA changed them. I have a number of them among my closest friends today, and they are among the best AA's I know.

You also have some people who are not alcoholics, but are addicts of other kinds. A great many AAs have taken pity on these people, and have actually tried to make them full-fledged AA's. Of course, their identification with alcoholics is no good at all, and the groups themselves easily stop this practice in the normal course of AA affairs.

Thoughtful AAs, however, encourage these sponsors to bring addicts to open meetings, just as they would any other interested people. In the end, these addicts usually gravitate to other forms of therapy. They are not received on the platform in open meetings unless they have an alcohol problem, and closed meetings are, of course, denied them. We know that we cannot do everything for everybody with an addiction problem.

There has also occurred lately a new development centering upon hippies who have LSD or marijuana troubles -- not so much stronger stuff. Many of these kids appear to be alcoholics also, and they are flocking into AA, often with excellent results.

Some weeks ago, there was a young people's convention of AAs. Shortly thereafter, four of these kids visited the office. I saw one young gal prancing down the hall, hair flying, in a mini-skirt, wearing love beads and the works. I thought, 'Holy smoke, what now!' She told me she was the oldest member of the young people's group in her area -- age twenty-two! They had kids as young as sixteen. I was curious and took the whole party out to lunch.

Well, they were absolutely wonderful. They talked (and acted) just about as good a kind of AA as I've seen anywhere. I think all of them said they had had some kind of drug problem, but had kicked that, too. When they first came around, they had insisted on their own ideas of AA, but in the end they found AA plenty good enough as it was. Though they needed their own meetings, they found interest and inspiration in the meetings of much older folks as well.

Perhaps, as younger people come into AA, we shall have to put up with some unconventional nonsense -- with patience and good humor, let's hope. But it should be well worth the attempt. And also, if various hippie addicts want to form their own sort of fellowship along AA lines, by all means let us encourage them. We need deny them only the AA name, and assure them that the rest of our program is theirs for the taking and using -- any part or all of it.

For these reasons, I feel hopeful and not a bit scared by this trend. Of course, I'm no prophet. I may be mistaken, so please keep me posted. This is a highly interesting and perhaps significant development. I certainly do not think it ought to be fought. Instead, it ought to be encouraged in what we already know to be workable channels.




