Tradition Three - Membership, Eligibility, Identify

The definition of *Member* is "the individuals composing a group"; *Membership* is "the body of members"; *Eligibility* is "the quality or state of being eligible"; *Eligible* is "qualified to be chosen" & *Identify* is "to be or become the same".

Tradition three is the only requirement for AA membership is a desire to stop drinking.

This tradition was an entirely new concept for me to wrap my keen alcoholic mind around when I first found AA and started my journey to change what was happening in my life. I was not aware that I was an alcoholic when I decided that my life was going wrong and needed something to happen. I did not know that AA even existed. But I was introduced to AA in treatment and at the halfway house.

I always thought that to be a member of something you needed to start it, have your family get you into it, have someone refer or take you, and back you up or confirm you, or know someone. I had no clue that I could say I was a member and be one because I had a desire to do something.

So, when I got to AA, I had no real feeling of self-worth. I was feeling guilt and remorse over how I had acted in my life. It was comforting to know that I was welcome as a member in spite of my imagined or actual faults with no questions asked. I watched the members around the tables and wanted to earn their friendship. So, the long journey back to self-respect, productivity, and to rejoining society as a whole began. I just had to have a desire to stop drinking. I was eligible.

There had been many challenges to this tradition and principle in the early years of AA. At one point it was said that if all the AA groups listed their membership requirements that no one would be eligible. And the list would be quite lengthy. But it was said in the discussion of someone being a member that "when confronted by the fear that is the true basis of intolerance, we need only ask, what would the Master do?" The emphasis on this tradition is to keep the primary focus of the fellowship from becoming diluted.

It was quite a process I went through to believe that this fellowship would really help me. I sat in meetings listening to everyone share wondering if I was really one of them. I saw differences galore, "that is not me". But through sponsorship and a network of members that told me what I needed to hear I saw that I needed to see the similarities and not the differences. So, I was able to identify.

I have been in the fellowship of AA now for quite some time and realize that I need to be in AA and not around AA. I do not need to tip toe thru the tulips with this deal that continues to save my life. I have a sponsor, a home group, a network of AA friends, work the steps, practice the spiritual principles in all my daily life as best as I can, serve the fellowship and help others. I try to be the only copy of the Big Book that someone sees thru my actions in my life. I guess that I am a member of the fellowship of AA.

What more can I be grateful for in my life?



National Corrections Facility Conference



The Third National Corrections Facility Conference was held in Houston, Texas, on the first through the third of November, 2019.
