Tradition Seven - Responsibility (Self-Support)

The definition of *Responsibility* is "The quality or state of being responsible: as moral, legal or mental accountability; Reliability, Trustworthiness. Responsible is to be able to answer to one's conduct and obligations". The definition of *Self-Support* is "Independent support of oneself or itself". The words defined in the 12 N 12 Dictionary are: Responsibility "obligation, commitment, duty, demands of position, custom, law, religion". Tradition Seven says that "Every AA group ought to be fully self-supporting, declining outside contributions".

The Long Form of the Tradition says that "The AA groups themselves ought to be fully self-supported by the voluntary contributions of their

members. We think that each group should soon achieve this ideal; that any public solicitation of funds using the name of Alcoholics Anonymous is highly dangerous, whether by groups, clubs, hospitals, or other outside agencies: that acceptance of large gifts from any source, or of contributions carrying any obligation whatever, is unwise. Then too, we view with much concern those AA treasuries which continue, beyond prudent reserves, to accumulate funds for no stated AA purpose. Experience has often warned us that nothing can so surely destroy our spiritual heritage as futile disputes over property, money, and authority.”

So, Tradition Seven is or has another spiritual principle which I can use to help me change my way of thinking, acting and the use of finances in my life, so I can reverse the self-centeredness and self-sufficiency that I brought with me into AA. Boy, what a change this was going to take! I had spent money very irresponsibly in the years leading to me being a member of Alcoholics Anonymous. Honestly, it does not change completely over the years in the fellowship, it takes a lifelong and daily commitment to reverse the process. I do know how to spend money and deal with finances like a teenager even as an adult trying to live to a spiritual purpose.

This tradition helps me be accountable to myself, my family, my friends, my job and to my group and the fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous. I had to learn how to not spend more than I take in or make. I had a lot of work to do with my sponsor on this deal. I did numerous inventories that had all or a portion of this spiritual principle included in it. I was very upset that a credit card company was calling me (I thought hounding me!) and it pissed me off (ok, upset me, sheesh!). I discussed with my sponsor and then we were dealing with ALL my finances. He said they did not want my money that they only wanted THEIR money that I had used. I guess that I missed that concept.

I had been using institutions, family, friends, work, etc. all my life just to get what I wanted when I wanted it. I had no thought or concern for others unless I was getting something out of it. So, coming into AA helped break the cycle of this consistent behavior. Some days being responsible does really suck but it does beat the merry-go-round that it was before. I was like a dog always chasing its tail. I lived check to check and always in a chaotic and in the moment type life. It was very seldom a peaceful existence.

AA has really helped me be able to change my thinking and way of living with this new principle of responsibility. I have learned to look at what I want and ask if it is really needed or wanted. To slow down and sleep on it before I pull the trigger on getting it. To look at the pros and cons of the deal for myself or for my family. It has gotten me and my family to work with a budget for our collective stuff. To discuss what we need or want to spend money on now. To be a team in the deal of living life. As a result, we discuss more stuff about ourselves now.

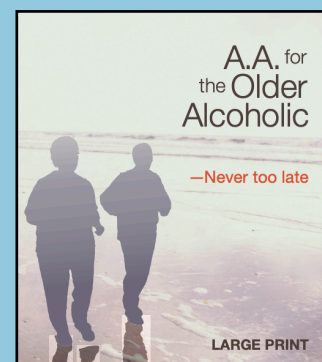
I have seen groups in AA deal with the finances, the spending of them, using prudent reserves, making budgets, being accountable with financial reports. The process the groups follow has shown me that this can apply to individuals as well. My thinking started to change as a result. Holding various service positions has also shown me the degree of the use of this tradition's principle for the good of AA as a whole and for helping the newcomers coming into the fellowship.

The reaching out to and thinking of others is the best way for me to live the spiritual principles of the AA fellowship on a daily basis. Because if I am living by the principle of being responsible then I can be an example of what a newcomer may want for themselves as they change their lives to become happy, useful and whole.

Texts, emails, social media, Skype and Zoom are coming in to our everyday lives to stay connected during the recommended social distancing. We will get past this.

Remember in the Twelve & Twelve, under Step 3, where it talks about when WWII broke out and was the first major test of this spiritual principle? Those AA's were scatted all over the world, and would they be able to be disciplined and stand up to all the heartaches of war? Well, it did! Their dependence upon a Higher Power worked.

So, I am sure that we all will endure this chapter of our lives and add this into our stories for the future newcomer. We don't stand alone in sobriety.

Anonymity... It's Mine or Is it?

In Alcoholics Anonymous we learn principles like love, tolerance, service, unity, humility, gratitude, sobriety and living in the present. All which we can generally agree without too much indifference. But what about anonymity? Some say, "100%, I do not break it no matter what!" Others say, "Well if I trust the individual..." and then there's some that say, "I don't care who knows. I'm proud to be in AA and I don't care what anyone thinks!" All have their right to their amount of discretion and each one's preference is to be respected to the fullest.

Anonymity is mine. One of the beautiful things I get from AA is an understanding of what and who I am. Breaking my anonymity is like living out any one of the many principles I practice throughout my daily life.

If a situation arises where the question of "Where are you going?" or "What do you think about (insert a number of situations where spirituality and morality is the topic)?", and when I begin to think about the answer, that is when I get to choose if anonymity needs to be concealed or revealed.

When I was in my drinking days, I would have a drink anywhere, in front of anyone, and didn't care what they might or might not think about it. I'd walk down the main street with beer in hand, not a care for the family driving by or the potential individual I may encounter later on in life, that may think negatively of my actions. So, when I am asked the questions, "Why don't you drink?", "When did you quit?", "Why do you think such and such?", I cannot help but recant my old ways and give credit to where the credit is due. I credit the program of Alcoholics Anonymous for where I am at today, Hell, my old ways didn't have anything of substance to give, so when someone is asking about how I ended a hellish lifestyle, how



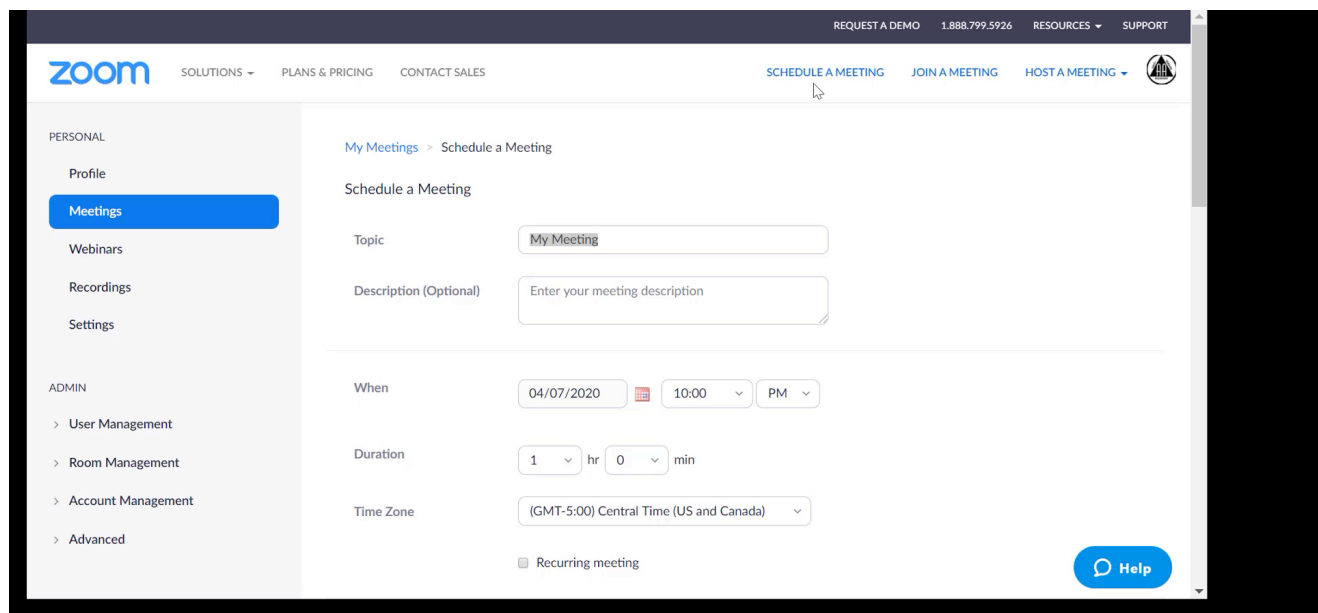
can I not explain the steps taken to be free from the bottle? I will break my anonymity 99 out of 100 times, with keeping in mind adherence to the 11th Tradition, I find it hard to think of the one reason why I would not. That's just my opinion on it. I was a low bottom drunk, destined for a bitter end, that lived only to drink to change the way I felt and perceived reality, and now, getting to live without an obsession to change any of that, just makes it really easy for me.

Anonymity is yours. Breaking anonymity is all fine for me, but what do I do if I run into a member at the grocery store, shopping mall, an event outside of AA, church...? Then, I am just another man passing by. I may not even wave to them. I have no idea if they are with someone from their job, someone from their family, or with someone that just might ask "How do you know that guy?" or "Where do you know him from?" I must be considerate to the fact that they may not be as open about being in recovery as I am. They may be struggling in their recovery, for all I know, and my openness could ignite a situation that causes harm to them for their lack in working their program. I must think of the other member's anonymity first. The same respect ought to be returned as well, that no one would break another member's or my anonymity. It is up to the individual AA's discretion.

Anonymity is easy to discuss in the rooms of AA, but this principle is really tested outside of the rooms. In just a little over fifteen months I have learned to respect myself, and more importantly, others. I am no longer that careless drunk on the main street downtown without regard for anyone. I must practice these principles in all my affairs and respecting a fellow members' anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our traditions, ever reminding me to place others before myself. Whether you agree with one side or the other on breaking anonymity, keep in mind that God gave us two ears to hear and one mouth to speak, so it may be best to be discreet on the matter altogether.
